United Way works to ignite Local Love in the community we call home. Local love is a genuine feeling that everyone deserves a safe place to live, work and raise their family. For the past 60 years, United Way of Saskatoon and Area has raised over \$119 million and worked to help kids be all that they can be, move people from poverty to possibility and build strong communities locally by addressing systemic barriers for our city's most vulnerable citizens. Our work involves

making informed financial investments that address short-term issues that are often ignored while focusing on making long-term positive change.

BEYOND SASKATOON

528 domestic violence emergency calls were responded to in the city of Prince Albert, providing immediate support to victims and families including follow up support ensuring that they are connected to ongoing services.

ALL THAT KIDS CAN BE

Children need a good start in life to become healthy adults. They need literacy access to early and developmental programs; positive school experiences during the middle years and support to graduate from high school. They benefit from recreational activities, mentorship, and opportunities to discover and develop their talents and interests.

United Way works to help kids thrive by supporting programing focused on:

- connectedness and community involvement;
- emotional and physical well-being; and
- engagement in learning.

143

children were matched with adult mentors and 87% reported feeling supported. 337

children participated in before and after school programing and 88% reported feeling better about themselves. 36

youth participated in a carpentry skills building program.

38,061

number of times a downtown youth support centre was accessed, offering crisis support, meals and snacks and agency referrals. 200

tutoring sessions were provided to children with learning disabilities, allowing them to return to/or stay in school.



140

children were provided financial subsidies to attend preschool, giving them a 4-8 month advantage in skill development and preparing them for kindergarten.

SUMMER SUCCESS LITERACY CAMPS

Summer Success camps deliver a two week program focused on targeted literacy strategies to help students in grades 1 to 4 maintain or improve their grade level reading during the summer

months. The program aims to prevent students from falling further behind during summer holidays; this digression is also known as 'summer slide.'

POVERTY TO POSSIBILITY

Every individual and family deserves to have their basic needs met.

United Way invests in programs and services that address the root causes of poverty so that individuals and families can be supported to live a sustainable and healthly life.

United Way works to move people from poverty to possibility by supporting programing focused on:

- employment and financial security;
- food security; and
- housing stability.

breakfasts and lunches were served to vulnerable individuals and families that may have otherwise gone without. 159

individuals were assisted with finding and maintaining housing and 100% reported an improved quality of housing.



JOURNEY HOME

Journey Home is the result of United Way's vision – that everyone in our community deserves a safe place to call home.

In April 2018 a Point-In-Time Homeless Count was conducted identifying chronically homeless individuals who have been homeless for six months or more and episodically homeless individuals who have experienced three or more episodes of homelessness in the past year. The count revealed that 475 individuals, including 11 children, were experiencing homelessness.

Since its inception in 2014, Journey Home has housed 79 of Saskatoon's most chronically homeless individuals, and reduced overall public service consumption by 57% among program residents, resulting in more than \$700,000 in civic cost savings.

Other public service reduction includes a 74% drop in police detention time, a 58% reduction in ambulance rides, and 91% drop in acute psychiatric day hospitalization.*

*Reduction stats based on 35 Journey Home participants who gave consent to have their information tracked and shared.

The team at Saskatoon Crisis Intervention Service learned of a young woman who was in a relationship with a very controlling spouse. There was a concern that he would end up incarcerated and she would then become homeless. The Journey Home team worked to find her housing but before move-in-day, she fled the city.

In December 2018 the team tried again, and this time they were successful in

finding the young women a placement, keeping her safe from danger. She was housed in February and set up with a plan to enter a year-long treatment program.

The young women is set to exit the treatment program in 2020 and will return home, to a place of her own, thanks to Journey Home.

BUILDING STRONG COMMUNITIES

Inclusion and engagement helps offset social isolation and strengthen the ability to integrate successfully into the community and workplace. When individuals and families can access supports and services that build skills and confidence, they are better equipped to overcome life challenges.

United Way works to build strong communities by supporting programing focused on:

- connection to supports;
- neighbourhood and community engagement; and
- personal well-being and safety.

individuals and families were provided access to HIV/AIDS services and 88% of people surveyed reported they received the service they needed.

782

court hearings/appearances were made on behalf of clients who could not afford this service otherwise.

criminalized women were connected to addictions treatment providing them the opportunity for a better life.

LGBTQ+ individuals were provided with peer support in a safe and inclusive space.

clients participated in financial literacy workshops and 96% reported accessing information about banking, budgeting and credit to help advance their financial well-being.

calls regarding mental health and addictions, suicide prevention and sexual assault were handled through mobile crisis services.



AUTHENTIC INDIGENOUS ENGAGEMENT

Our community is strongest when everyone has the opportunity to reach their full potential.

Inclusion of the Indigenous community and respect for their culture, traditions and governance structures is a fundamental value of United Way of Saskatoon and Area.

Indigenous peoples continue to be over-represented in statistics related to homelessness, poverty, school readiness, and experiences of racism and discrimination. For our city to improve the quality of life for everyone, we need to ensure that community services are designed and delivered with our local people and priorities in mind. By authentically engaging the Indigenous community in decision making, United Way can become more responsive and effective towards achieving better outcomes in the areas of housing, employment, early years education, and health services. 211 SASKATCHEWAN







A significant barrier for individuals and families to accessing the services they need is the complexity of finding the information they are looking for. Whether it is finding assistance with basic needs such as food, shelter and employment, looking for support for an aging parent, or trying to find childcare, navigating through information can be overwhelming, confusing and ultimately a roadblock to finding support.

211 Saskatchewan connects people to a database of over 5,000 community, government and non-emergency health services across the province. People can access this service by text, website and webchat, or phone. It is available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, 365 days a year in over languages, including 17 Indigenous languages available by phone.

In June 2018, United Way of Saskatoon and Area and United Way Regina traveled across the province visiting 7 locations; Saskatoon, La Ronge, Prince Albert, Swift Current, Moose Jaw, Estevan and Regina to officially launch the 211 service expansion and inform each community of the new phone, text and web chat services.

This service expansion was possible thanks to the generous support from the Community Initiatives Fund and CanPacific Potash.

118,791

unique visits were made on the 211 Saskatchewan

Top three searches included mental health, homelessness/housing and income support.

577 phone calls, 127 texts and 107 web chats were made between March and December.

87% of people surveyed reported they found the website useful and 66% learned about a new service they did not know exsisted.
